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### **Pastor's Thoughts**

"I am drafting this message Wednesday afternoon, less than 18 hours since election results began being broadcast. I am having mixed emotions - between hope and disgust. I am working to manage my anxiety by meeting with church folk, cleaning house and preparing for a walk – in between meetings.

"Part of growing as a person of faith, which includes practicing mindfulness is noticing the discomfort, anxiety or fear and not allowing them to overwhelm you – stepping outside the emotion to say, "That is not me but I can see how I am affected by these events. Said more plainly: I am not my feelings. And neither are you.

"No matter what you are feeling, it is not wrong. How you use the energy from those feelings and what you do matters quite a bit, both to yourself and to those who inhabit world.

"The Spirit picked a very difficult lesson for the focus scripture this coming Sunday. It's Romans 13:1-10 where the apostle Paul admonishes his church folk to subject themselves to governmental authority, saying that those in power were put there by God. I do not think God micromanages the affairs of the world to such a degree, so that's my first break with Paul's thinking. The other is that the church is supposed to be among the moral voices that hold the government to account. That has always been the role of religious traditions. It sometimes works for the common good and sometimes for ill. Sometimes it makes no difference because the status quo serves both the government and communities of faith. (Ugh!)

"I have entitled my sermon "Subjects." I already have three drafts in the making. I guess I am managing stress by writing quite a bit, too. Between now and then, I will be praying without ceasing, for you, for our nation, and for the kin-dom of God, whose relational requirements sometimes exceed my convictions. I must pray for and love myself – as should you, beloved child of God."

"Encouraged by robust worship service attendance and engagement, the Deacons continue to consider ways to help ensure our on-line worship is welcoming to our congregation, community and beyond.

"In addition, the Deacons have enjoyed partnering with Pastor Mark Seifried to help plan and support new opportunities for us to connect with each other and with the spirit within and around us, such as the Blessing of the Animals and small neighborhood group gatherings.

"Looking ahead, we are now focusing on how to make Advent and Christmas memorable and meaningful. We aspire for our church to live fully and joyfully into the season, maintaining traditions while celebrating in novel ways."

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### **WilliNet** – Community Television for Williamstown

"All of us at First Church Williamstown know how valuable WilliNet is to our community. We've used it to record speakers and Second Hour programs for several years. (You can still watch your favorites today on WilliNet.org!) When COVID – 19 came to town, WilliNet was deemed an "essential service" by the Mt. Greylock Regional School District.

"The Town of Williamstown depended on WilliNet to provide the technology to deliver municipal meetings remotely. WilliNet began producing weekly local COVID-19 updates; our church and others turned to WilliNet to record and/or distribute their weekly services when we closed our doors.

"The Council on Aging asked WilliNet to produce exercise and yoga classes for the newly home-bound seniors. Local fitness businesses asked WilliNet to broadcast their workouts. WilliNet produced "Storytime" with local folks, young and old, reading picture books, as well as yoga/relaxation classes for elementary school children. These programs are broadcast on Spectrum TV channels 1302 or 1303, uploaded to the WilliNet website posted on the WilliNet

Facebook page, and emailed weekly to some 1,350 subscribers. We count on WilliNet to give us news of local issues, political candidates, town government, and so more much more. They even broadcast our Town Meeting live from Weston Field. That was an accomplishment!

"Full disclosure – I'm on the Board of Directors of WilliNet. Because I've gotten a glimpse of what goes on behind the scenes, I appreciate this local treasure even more! Next time you see Debby Dane, Jack Criddle or any of the WilliNet crew, be sure to give them a big thank you!

"By the way, did you see our own Carol Stein-Payne in this public service announcement, produced by WilliNet, reminding us to Mask Up!"

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### Stewardship November 2020 Report

"The completion of the fire suppression system is underway. Final plans are with the engineers and the fabrication of pipes will be ordered. With the help of Centerline Architects, the plans were modified to prevent exposed pipes in the front foyer and under the portico outside. Hiding the overhead pipes will protect our historic architecture.

"The cost was very close to what was estimated 5 years ago. The \$150,500 will come from the Stewardship budget in 2020 and 2021. Work should begin before the end of this year.

"The plans are moving forward to complete repairs that will prevent water leakage in the steeple and sanctuary. These are temporary until the roof can be replaced which is a top priority of the new non-profit. There will be caulking done around the west chimney of the sanctuary roof. The louvers on the upper levels of the steeple will be temporarily covered. Most of the water damaging the front foyer, front of the sanctuary, and leaking down the steeple is coming through these louvers.

"Unfortunately, this will impact the ability to hear the steeple bell until those louvered windows can be removed, rebuilt and replaced. Because of the damage to the wood structure below and the flooring of the steeple levels this is necessary until we can complete the overall steeple repair.

"The capital campaign task force has submitted an application with the state to create a new nonprofit that will fund-raise and oversee the renovations and repairs needed on our historic building. The non-profit is named the Williamstown Meetinghouse Preservation Fund.

"The board will be both church and non-church members and will represent the variety of skills needed for fundraising, construction management, historic preservation, and grant writing.

"Pat Leach has been a tremendous help by researching and writing a history of our several meetinghouses in Williamstown, including the one we occupy today. The meetinghouse preservation fund creates an opportunity to unite our church community, local businesses, and residents to protect and preserve this iconic structure.

"Plans for our annual pledge drive and 2021 budget are underway.

"Stay safe as we move into colder weather."
