

ESOL (English to Speakers of Other Languages) News and Recognition

After federal funding ran out in December, First Congregational Church donated \$1,000 from the Immigrant Family Support Fund to support the continuation of ESOL classes this semester for refugees at St. Stephen's Church, and I then solicited donations from others in the Berkshires who have supported the resettlement of the Afghan families. Thanks to the generous support of many in our community, the classes have resumed.

A thank you note was sent to all donors to this endeavor, viz.:

Hello everyone,

Thanks to your generous support, sufficient funds were raised for the ESOL classes administered by Berkshire Community College to continue this semester at St. Stephen's Church. I happened to be in the building the first day that classes resumed and the energy and excitement was so uplifting. Many hugs were exchanged as people shared how excited they were to continue. What a gift it is for immigrants and refugees to be able to attend these classes and bring their small children with them if necessary (this is the only daytime ESOL class in Pittsfield for which this is an option). Some refugees have started attending these classes days after their arrival in the Berkshires, which is a big boost for them as opposed to signing up on a wait-list for other ESOL classes. Not only are they studying English, but these students are connecting with a supportive community of learners and helpers and exchanging resources and ideas. When necessary, these students are able to easily consult with their caseworkers from Jewish Family Services and the Berkshire Immigrant Center during breaks or before or after class since both agencies have their offices at St. Stephen's Church.

January 24 was International Day of Education and UNESCO is dedicating this year's International Day to the girls and women of Afghanistan:

UNESCO would like to dedicate the fifth edition of this International Day to all the girls and women in Afghanistan, who have been denied their right to learn, study and teach. The Organization condemns this serious attack on human dignity and on the fundamental right to education.

Thank you for your support for the immigrants and refugees in this English class, who are so eager to learn as they settle into the Berkshires. We are enriched by their presence and thankful to community members like you for welcoming them.
