Heard at Church Council.... 4/18/23

- Over 100 people attended Easter Services in all, at Sunrise, in the Sanctuary, and by Zoom!
- The Berkshire Eagle had a very favorable illustrated article about our church which ran April 11th. It featured us as a vibrant, committed group, determined to keep our building in good repair, and excited to find ways to reach out for more community use of The Meetinghouse. - Have you noticed the two new banners hanging between the pillars of the front portico?

We feel it's important we show our progressive Christian values with the "Black Lives Matter" and "LBGTQ+" flags on display.

- Susan Yates, for the Meetinghouse Preservation Fund, sent word that they have the building permit to go ahead soon with a metal mesh lining to our steeple louvers to keep out the rain and snow! The mesh and better drainage will help prevent water damage and keep costs down. The WMPF is getting estimates for new roofing, and hopes for installation this summer.
- Moderator Betsy Burris heads up a group working on safety and emergency response protocols. They are in contact with St. John's Church about their practices. There might even be FEMA grants if equipment is warranted.
- Have you noticed the new wording on our signs? We are renewing the old name "The Meetinghouse of First Congregational Church," a title that goes back to 1767 when the required congregational church was the only meeting place in our new town.
- The Building Taskforce meets regularly to brainstorm ways to promote use of The Meetinghouse, keeping the church viable for us and for the town. Sherwood Guernsey reported that Williams College is not interested in acquiring the land and building at this time. But he is excited about the tenants who have engaged some unused rooms and underused spaces. This also adds funds useful for proper maintenance.
- Council discussed reviving the neighborhood groups system as a way of renewing connection with each other that may have been lost during COVID times, or starting up a phone tree for times we have information to share and want to get the word out quickly.
- Kathy Hurley has volunteered to do an inventory of our kitchen, and organize items used for a simplified Sunday Fellowship time. She suggests a dedicated rolling cart with everything available together. Then anyone can help with Coffee hour. Yay Kathy!
- Elayne in the Office, Trevor Murphy and Betsy have been updating our website with new features plus removing outdated references. There is so much good stuff there about us!
- Council also focused on timely communication with the congregation at large, and this article you are reading is one result. A summary of Council proceedings will be posted each month in the Friday Eblast shortly after Council meets, and also reprinted in Church Chatter. Throughout most of my life, I've occasionally had dreams of being lost (in a building, a parking lot, a suburb, on a mountain side., wherever). I've been baffled by these dreams and unable to understand the reason/s for them. Recently, my occasional dreams have shifted to having lost something and not being able to find it. Perhaps my feelings of being lost or having lost something refer to my being out of touch with the spiritual dimension of my being.

I've long believed that each of us has this spiritual dimension, but more often than not we aren't aware of it because it's layered over by the dominate conditioning of our culture. It's one thing to intellectually believe in our underlying spirituality; it's another actually to give expression to it, It's far easier to ignore or to deny it and be dominated by conventional beliefs and practices, many of which are tinged with hatred.
